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1. Introduction

- Identify the key roles, responsibilities and contacts to respond to an emergency.

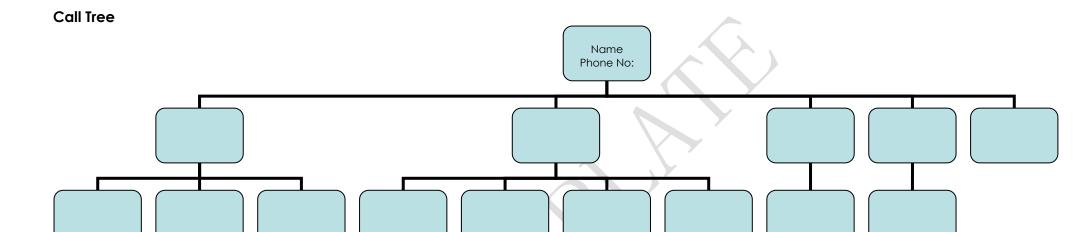
